

Church Maintenance Update – Church Ceiling

Last weekend I spoke at all the Masses and explained the need to address the problems which have arisen with the vaulted plaster ceiling in our church. Several months ago, I requested an inspection of the church's ceiling as I was aware of what had happened at St. Patrick's Church in Norristown. (A few years ago, large chunks of the ceiling at

St. Patrick's began to fall which necessitated the closure of the church and an almost two-year major repair effort which was quite costly.)

Knowing the age of our building, I thought that there might be the possibility of future problems for us as there had been for St. Patrick's Church. The inspection revealed that the plaster on our ceiling is compromised. The compromise occurred because of water leaks in the roof and decades' worth of excessive humidity in the attic during the summer months. A new roof was placed on the main body of the church during Father Nasta's pastorate. An attic exhaust system was installed during this past summer to relieve the space of its excessive heat.

After consulting with the Property Services Office of the Archdiocese as well as with our finance and stewardship committees it was agreed that the stabilization and preservation of our ceiling was a necessity. We have hired the John Tiedemann Company to stabilize the ceiling with a state -of-the-art restoration system developed by a Canadian firm called Historic Plaster Conservation Services (HPCS).

We have a wood lath and plaster ceiling which functions as a suspended system. However, over time and because of water damage and humidity ceilings such as ours deteriorate systemically. The HPCS method addresses the entire ceiling rather than just isolated spots. This is a labor-intensive project which will begin on Monday, January 8th and will take between six and eight weeks to complete.

While the church will be able to be used for daily Mass and the weekend Masses, it will be closed Monday through Friday immediately after daily Mass. For safety reasons, no one maybe in church while the workmen are on the job. The cost of this project is \$320,000.00.

Funeral Masses

Beginning on January 8th and until the ceiling work is completed, we will not be able to conduct any Funeral Masses in our parish church. Instead, all funerals will take place at the former Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Church (St. John the Baptist) on Ford Street in Bridgeport. Father DiMaria and parish staff will conduct and assist with any Sacred Heart parishioner's funeral which will need to take place at St. John's during the time while construction is happening.

Eucharistic Wednesdays Suspended

Due to the work which will occur in our Church, Eucharistic Adoration on Wednesdays will be suspended until further notice.

Pro-Life Wednesday Holy Hour



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THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD - JANUARY 7, 2024

Reflection by Rev. Leonard N. Peterson

This beautiful Epiphany feast always holds a unique place for me and my family, especially when the date for it was fixed on January 6, the "Twelfth Day of Christmas." That was my beloved mom's birthday. Added in the fact that my mother spent her early years in the Epiphany parish located in South Philadelphia.

Now that the Epiphany is celebrated on a Sunday the date is flexible. But this was a good change, because the feast was often lost to churchgoers when it fell on a weekday. The event deserves our full attention because of its significance.

What it celebrates is captured in the very word "Epiphany" itself. It means a "manifestation" or "showing." It is the showing of Christ to the wider Gentile world beyond the world of the Jews. It implies His embrace of the same.

Up until now, we note that Christ came into the Jewish world. Both His earthly parents were good Jews, as were His grandparents and His whole extended family. St. Matthew, writing for Jewish converts to the faith, wanted to let them know that Christ came to embrace the whole world, and not just one nation.

So, for today, we can meditate and learn about "the wideness of God's mercy." His divine plan for the salvation of the world does not involve exclusions. Still, the perennial questions arise: "Who or what is at the center of our lives? Is it really Christ Jesus or not?"

Here is a selection from the texts for today's feast found at St. Paul's Episcopal Cathedral in London:

The Magi

It might have been just someone else's story;
Some chosen people get a special king,
We leave them to their own peculiar glory,
We don't belong, it doesn't mean a thing.
But when these three arrive they bring us with them,
Gentiles like us, their wisdom might be ours;
A steady step that finds an inner rhythm,
A pilgrim's eye that sees beyond the stars.
They did not know his name but still they sought him
They came from otherwhere but still they found;
In palaces they found those who sold and bought him,
But in the filthy stable, hallowed ground.
Their courage gives our questing hearts a voice
To seek, to find, to worship, to rejoice.
